We look forward to sharing how hard your children are working at our parents evenings on 7th and 8th November.




Hop tu Naa is the oldest continuously-existing tradition in the Isle of Man. Celebrated on the 31st of October. One of the key features of Hop tu naa is the "moot" (turnip), which is hollowed out and decorated; there is also a range of popular folk songs with regional differences, in both English and Manx; there is a traditional folk dance still practiced across the Island today; and there are some unusual customs and superstitions which link back to the ancient Celtic beliefs about this time of year. We know that not everyone is comfortable in taking part with Halloween, but we like to make sure we focus on the Manx traditions.

We are encouraging all pupils to use good manners at lunchtime whilst in the dining room – and you can help at home by reinforcing these expectations.

We ask that children -

- · use a knife and fork to eat hot meals
- · Eat their main meal before their pudding
- Eat with their mouth closed
- · Don't walk around with food in their mouths
- · Don't talk with food in their mouths
- · Don't touch anyone else's food
- · Never throw food

Although it is a social time, we expect children to focus on eating their meal – as they have plenty of time for chatting out in the playground.
